I. <u>Proposed Ordinance Title/Reference</u>: Proposed ordinance amending Hernando County Code Chapter 2, Article V, to modify thresholds for approval and execution of contracts and local bidder preference, exclude cybersecurity-related items from the applicability of Chapter 2, Article V, and to provide for competitive solicitation protests. II. ## Prevention Code. III. Summary of Proposed Ordinance and Statement of Public Purpose to be Served:

d. Section 633.202, Florida Statutes, relating to the Florida Fire

The proposed ordinance amends Hernando County Code, Chapter 2, Article V, known as the Hernando County Procurement Ordinance, to divide it into Divisions 1 and 2; Division 1 will be the current Article V but with a modifications to threshold amounts for approval and execution of contracts and local bidder preference, and Division 2 will be a new section titled "Competitive Solicitation Protests".

If enacted, the chief procurement officer will have the authority to approve and execute contracts of less than \$50,000.00; the local bidder preference threshold will increase to \$50,000.00; and the procedure for bidders and potential bidders to protest Hernando County competitive solicitations will be clarified and streamlined. The Procurement Ordinance will be renumbered to accommodate the addition of Division 2.
