The Southwest Florida Water Management District's (District) mission is to protect water resources, minimize flood risks, and ensure the public's water needs are met. The District's responsibilities can be grouped under four general areas which form our core mission: water supply, water quality, natural systems and flood protection.

This letter specially addresses our goal for the natural systems area of responsibility. As outlined in our Strategic Plan, the goal for natural systems is to preserve, protect and restore natural systems to support their natural hydrologic and ecologic functions.

As described in Governing Board Policy Annual Habitat Letter, the District is providing elected officials and administrations updated information regarding permitted wetland impacts, mitigation and habitat restoration activities within the District's boundaries. The restoration efforts by our staff and partners tie directly to our natural systems goal.

Since 1984, the District has seen 11,743 acres of wetlands habitat impacted through District permits. During this same period, the District, through projects or permit requirements, has restored or created 49,648 acres of wetlands and adjacent upland habitat; a net gain of 37,904 acres (see chart enclosed).

In Hernando County, during the same time, there have been 107 acres of impacts while 1,756 acres of wetland and adjacent upland habitats have been restored or created. This accomplishment is an example of the importance of preserving these systems to support their natural hydrologic and ecologic functions.
