




The paved part Richloam Clay Sink Rd was constructed in the 1870's with flint rocks, stumps and other various materials on hand as the road base. The roads width and foundation was designed for Model T vehicles. In the 1920's oil was applied to the dirt surface to make the road more stable. In the 1950's asphalt was added over the oiled dirt. In the late 1990's a tar and pebble was added on top of the asphalt.





The area of concern is 0.6 miles long.






The average two lane road in the state of Florida is 24 feet wide.




The current "unposted" speed limit for Richloam Clay Sink Rd is 25 mph.

Richloam Clay Sink Rd also has issues with heavy vehicles traveling it on a daily basis




Some of the heavy traffic is trucks using Richloam Clay Sink Rd as a short cut to Lakeland




The log trucks travel 4.2 miles down Richloam Clay Sink Rd. to get to the mulch yard.




If the log trucks were to access the mulch yard from SR 471, they would only travel 0.6 miles across a forestry-maintained road.




