Hernando County Fire Rescue protects a great deal of critical infrastructure in our 589 square mile jurisdiction. There are multiple interstate and intrastate roadways (I75, US19, US41, US98, US 301, Suncoast Parkway) that provide interconnectivity for commuter, tourist, and commercial traffic. These roadways also play an integral role in evacuations and pre-positioning of assets before, during, and after hurricane natural disasters for not only our area, but to include the entire State of Florida. We have 10 elementary schools, 7 middle schools, 5 high schools, 26 prekindergarten schools, 13 private school, 3 charter schools, and the Pasco-Hernando Community College within our jurisdiction. Many of the public schools serve as shelters in case of emergencies within the County. We protect the freshwater treatment and delivery system, wastewater treatment facility, Withlacoochee River Electric grid, Duke Energy grid, Sumter Energy grid and several natural gas utilities to include transmission lines that support the region. In addition, there are 65 radio communications towers within the County that we protect. Three hospitals, one mental health inpatient facility, and one inpatient rehabilitation facility, 7 ambulatory surgical facilities, 9 adult family care homes, 26 assisted living facilities, and 6 skilled nursing facilities within our county rely on our department for all hazard response. The Hernando County Sheriff's Office, jail, two Sheriff's substations and a county courthouse that houses the 5th District

Court for the State of Florida are in our jurisdiction. We work closely with the Brooksville Tampa Bay Regional Airport and our ARFF team to protect the airfield and be prepared for an emergency. This airport serves as the emergency landing field for aircraft in the greater Tampa Bay region. We also work with two Army National Guard installations, one armory, and the Camp Blanding Army Airfield. Lastly, we respond to all state and federal offices located within the county, including 7 United States Post Offices. During and after a disaster, there are many locations within the County that may serve as **Disaster Recovery Centers and Points of** Distribution for essential supplies. These locations must be evaluated and be ready to open as expeditiously as possible to ensure residents receive all necessary materials and supplies to aid in quick recovery after an emergency event.

Our fire budget is 99% derived from Municipal Service Benefit Unit funds. The other 1% is from donations, firefighter education reimbursement, and impact fees from new construction. Our EMS budget is 50% derived from Municipal Service Taxing Unit dollars. 49% is derived from ambulance service fees and balance of 1% is from miscellaneous revenue. The 2024 County referendum to increase the local sales tax to fund public safety improvements failed. Additionally, proposed increases to fire assessment fees to cover overhead costs have not been implemented. Impact fees, currently collected at 22%, are insufficient to fund necessary capital improvements. As the population grows, there are demands for three new fire stations totaling \$21 million in the next five years. Two existing stations are undersized, and the logistics warehouse is inadequate. Given these challenges, securing funding for these critical capital needs remains a significant obstacle. While fire stations typically have a 50-year lifespan, many of our stations are 30-35 years old, requiring increased maintenance to remain operational. As these stations approach the end of their useful life, we must carefully consider replacement or extensive renovation options to maintain level of service. To meet our growing needs, we have constructed three replacement fire stations since 2021, financed through lines of credit. These loans require annual payments of \$337,106 for Station 2 through 2072, \$495,000 for Station 5 through 2071, and \$54,000 for Station 6 through 2031, totaling \$886,106 annually. Our average collection rate for EMS service billing is 75%. Our ALS (Advanced Life Support) billing rate is \$1,072 per

transport. On average in fiscal year FY 2024, after approved rate adjustments from the insurance companies, we receive \$449 per service call (42% of our billed rate). While we do not recover 100% of our costs for these services, we are committed to continually offering top-notch emergency care for our residents. Households in Hernando County earn a median yearly income of \$62,764. This is 14% less than the state average, and 21% than the nation. Our unemployment rate 4.8%; compared to the state rate of 3.3%. Of the total population, 11.8% persons below the poverty line; with 13% of children and 11% of seniors in poverty. Additionally, Hernando County's economic landscape has shifted, with a decrease in local employment from 60% in 2022 to 54.5% in 2024. Key industries include healthcare, retail, service facilities, and hospitality. The income limitations and commuting patterns of our residents constrain opportunities for fundraising and financial support within the community. The total budget for the Hernando County Fire Rescue Department is \$105,039,773.00. The total Fire budget is \$50,407,318.00, and EMS budget is \$54,632,455.00. Our fire budget includes Personnel: \$24,361,292 (49%); Operating Costs: \$8,542,554 (17%); Capital Outlay: \$949,063 (1.88%); Debt Service: \$741,865 (1.47%), Non-Operating Expenditures: \$15,120,776 (29.98%); Interfund Transfers: \$641,768 (1.27%); and grant match funds: \$50,000.00 (.09%). Our EMS budget includes Personnel: \$18,580,478 (34%); Operating Costs: \$8,946,296 (16.38%); Capital Outlay: \$3,210,750 (5.88%); Debt Service: \$177,109 (.32%); Grants and Aid: \$8,552 (.02%); Non-Operating Expenditures: \$23,017,929 (42%); interfund transfers: \$651,341 (1.19%); and grant match: \$40,000 (.07%). The Hernando County Board of County Commissioners has a reserve policy of 18.5%; however, they prefer for that contingency to be maintained closer to 25% for operational efficiency. We have dedicated our reserve to be utilized for contingency and cost overruns for capital construction projects. This funding cannot be used for operations and training as it would be inconsistent with Board policy.

Hernando County Fire Rescue is a career department located in Hernando County, Florida that covers 589 square miles spanning from the Gulf of Mexico north of the Tampa Bay metro to east of Interstate 75. We have a very diverse response area that includes very dense

residential areas, commercial districts including a Walmart distribution center, coastal recreation areas, and rural farmland to include horse farms with multi-million-dollar facilities in un-hydranted areas. We respond to all types of incidents including structural fires, EMS, water rescue, hazardous materials, motor vehicle accidents, airport rescue firefighting, urban search and rescue, and wildland fire suppression. We work closely with the Hernando County Emergency Management Division on routine and escalating natural disasters such as hurricanes. A recent internal risk assessment highlighted a 24% increase in major calls for EMS service since 2020. Simultaneously, the overall County population has grown by 12%, much of which occurred in areas not previously identified for significant growth, increasing service call times. Due to the lack of affordable health care options in the County, more residents are using emergency rooms for routine medical, mental health and dental concerns. This increased need strains the already limited services Hernando County has for more complex emergencies. The average response time for incidents across the County is 7.52 minutes for all incidents, with the average length of service for motor vehicle calls lasting 23.54 minutes. The length of these service calls compounded by the increase in total service calls creates additional strain on existing personnel and leads to fatigue, turnover, and burnout. As the population of the County increases, the character of the department has changed. While we have grown by 16% since 2020, a significant portion of our institutional knowledge has retired. Nearly 60% of our personnel have less than ten years of experience, while only 12% have over twenty. This generational shift, coupled with a national shortage of emergency services professionals, presents significant challenges. There is a critical need for well-qualified, dedicated emergency services personnel to assist in our growing need for service. Additionally, as the three new fire stations come online, there will be a need for approximately 72 qualified personnel to staff those stations.
