The Hernando/Citrus Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) Board held a regular public meeting beginning at 1:30 p.m. at the Lecanto Government Building, 3600 W. Sovereign Path, Room 166, Lecanto, Florida. The meeting was advertised in the Hernando Sun and Citrus County Chronicle newspapers and the agenda was available on the Hernando/Citrus MPO website.

MEETING CALLED TO ORDER

- Vice Chair Campbell called the meeting to order at 1:30 p.m.
- The Pledge of Allegiance and the introductions of Board and staff followed the Invocation.
- A quorum was declared, and the affidavit of publication was read into the record.

MPO BOARD MEMBERSHIP AFFIRMATIONS

- **Motion:** A motion was made by Commissioner Bays to approve the appointment of Mayor Joe Meek as the representative on the MPO Board for the City of Crystal River. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Kinnard and the motion passed 7-0.
- *Motion:* A motion was made Mayor Bell to acknowledge and approve the appointment of Council Members Robert Holmes and Ken Brown as Alternate Representatives on the MPO Board for the City of Crystal River. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Bays and the motion passed 7-0.
- *Motion:* A motion was made Commissioner Bays to acknowledge and approve the appointment of Council Member Christa Tanner as Alternate Representative on the MPO Board for the City of Brooksville. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Kinnard and the motion passed 7-0.

APPROVAL/MODIFICATION OF AGENDA

Motion: A motion was made by Mayor Meek to approve the agenda. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Bays and the motion passed 7-0.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES - AUGUST 3, 2023

Motion: A motion was made by Commissioner Bays to approve the August 3, 2023, meeting Minutes. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Allocco and the motion passed 7-0.

PRESENTATION – VULNERABILITY AND RISK ASSESSMENT (RESILIENCE STUDY) FOR TRANSPORTATION INFRASTRUCTURE – PRESENTATION OF FINAL REPORT BY BENESCH & ASSOCIATES (General Planning Consultant)

[It is noted for the record that Commissioner Narverud arrived at the meeting.]

Rob Cursey, Benesch & Associates General Planning Consultant, made a presentation to the MPO Board on the final report of the Vulnerability and Risk Assessment (Resilience) for Transportation Infrastructure Study. Commissioner Allocco asked why Bayport/Pine Island was not classified as Tier I. Mr. Cursey noted it was likely due to land use being residential versus containing major facilities such as hospital and emergency facilities; however, Mr. Cursey will review this area to confirm if the area is correctly classified.

There was Board discussion regarding the Suncoast Parkway designated as a Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) designated facility versus US 19 for evacuation purposes. Mr. Cursey affirmed the Study identified that US 19 is vulnerable as a critical roadway during storm events and the Suncoast Parkway should be the priority corridor during such events. Siaosi Fine, Florida Turnpike Enterprises, affirmed the Suncoast Parkway is a SIS designated facility. Brian Hunter, with the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), explained the SIS system is used to showcase the importance of a road to move goods (freight) and people versus identifying evacuation routes. Mr. Hunter expressed that the SIS designation of US 19 could be reviewed but removing the SIS designation may not achieve the Board's goal. Mr. Hunter suggested using signage to direct the public to use the Suncoast Parkway versus US 19 for evacuation purposes.

Commissioner Allocco mentioned that historically the Hernando/Citrus coastal area has not experienced a direct hit from a hurricane but has encountered significant impact from storm surge. As such, Commissioner Allocco expressed future studies could benefit if the data was analyzed in terms of storm surge versus hurricane levels. Mr. Cursey affirmed future studies could feature storm surge impact but assured the Board the current study encompassed information which included hurricane level 5 data.

Commissioner Allocco asked if County Line Road in Hernando County was evaluated during the Study and why County Line Road is not being considered as a candidate for the SIS system. Mr. Hunter affirmed SIS is a limited network with strict criteria; one criterion for SIS is regional connectivity and connecting major population centers to each other. County Line Road falls short of regional connectivity. Commissioner Allocco asked if evacuation routes should be included as a criterion for SIS routes. Mr. Hunter relayed that state legislation defines SIS criterion, but he would review County Line Road for SIS designation opportunities. Ms. Elwin confirmed that County Line Road was included in the Study and is classified as Tier II. Commissioner Kinnard expressed the interest to evaluate the SIS network between Hernando and Citrus counties. Mr. Hunter indicated the SIS Coordinator for FDOT could provide further information on SIS designated facilities during a future Board meeting.

Motion: A motion was made by Commissioner Kinnard to approve the Vulnerability and Risk Assessment Study. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Narverud and the motion passed 8-0.

ACTION ITEMS

- 1. Hernando County Transportation Disadvantaged Local Coordinating Board (TDLCB) Member Appointment.
 - *Motion:* A motion was made by Commissioner Allocco to appoint Kathleen Winters to serve as a member for the Local Medical Community Representative on the Hernando County Transportation Disadvantaged Local Coordinating Board (TDLCB) effective November 8, 2023, through November 7, 2026. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Narverud and the motion passed 8-0.

Commissioner Allocco encouraged people to serve on boards and committees and emphasized their volunteerism is important for board and committees to work effectively. Commissioner Allocco thanked Ms. Winters for applying to serve on the TDLCB again.

2. Review and Approval of the Proposed 2024 Meeting Schedule for the Hernando/Citrus MPO Board and Committees

Council Member McBride shared his preference to have a deputy present during MPO Board meetings and to conduct the 2024 MPO Board meetings at the Brooksville City Council for ease of accessibility. Commissioner Allocco relayed there is a second parking lot that provides easier access to the Hernando County Commissioners Chambers should the MPO Board meetings move to the Commissioners Chambers and staff can distribute a map to the second parking lot.

Motion: A motion was made Commissioner Kinnard to approve the meeting calendar for 2024. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Narverud and the motion passed 8-0.

3. Annual Roll-Forward Amendment to the Adopted Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) for FY 2024-FY 2028

- *Motion:* A motion was made Commissioner Narverud to approve the Annual Roll-Forward Amendment to the Adopted Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) for FY 2024 FY 2028, authorize the MPO Vice Chair's signature thereon, and authorize staff to submit the TIP to the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) and required review agencies. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Bays and the motion passed 8-0.
- 4. Review and approve an Interlocal Agreement between the Hernando County Board of County Commissioners and the Pasco County Board of County Commissioners for County Line Road with Support and Assistance by the Pasco County Metropolitan Planning Organization, the Hernando/Citrus Metropolitan Planning Organization, and the Florida Department of Transportation
 - *Motion:* A motion was made Commissioner Allocco to approve the multi-agency Interlocal Agreement for the improvements to County Line Road as indicated therein and authorize the Vice Chair's signature thereupon. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Kinnard and the motion passed 8-0.

CITIZEN COMMENTS

There were no citizen comments.

MPO DIRECTOR COMMENTS

- Mr. Esposito emphasized the need to have quorum for the November 2, 2023, MPO Board meeting to approve the Apportionment Plan with its associated Resolution as the documents are required to be sent to the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) immediately to meet the November 14, 2023, federally required deadline. FDOT is currently finalizing the functionally classified urbanized maps that are based on the 2020 census data.
- FDOT and Florida Turnpike Enterprises (FTE) will present their 5-year work programs at the November 2, 2023, meeting.
- The FDOT Safety Liaison will give a presentation at the November 2, 2023, meeting. As a reminder, annual grant applications are due in February 2024.
- In accordance with the adopted UPWP, MPO Staff completed a review of the Continuity of Operations Plan (COOP). This is a safety sensitive document staff utilizes as reference during weather events, health events, and other types of situations that may occur.
- For the Board's information, Staff is in the process of updating the Public Participation Plan (PPP) and associated bylaws. These will be presented during MPO Board's meeting on December 7, 2023.
- As a point of information to the MPO Board and for the benefit of the public, the Withlacoochee Trail Bridge on US41 will be improved during the time of construction between the first and second segments.
- 2050 Long-Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) Scope A was completed, and Scope B is underway. The final scopes, C and D, will need to be issued immediately after the new GPC contracts are approved by the MPO Board which is tentatively scheduled for the November 2, 2023.

BOARD MEMBER COMMENTS

- Commissioner Kinnard shared the Inverness school board's desire to schedule US 41 construction, in front of the middle school, during the summer months when school is in recess, if possible. Council Member McBride concurred.
- Council Member McBride asked Mr. Hunter for an update on work being performed on US 41 north of Inverness and Commissioner Kinnard suggested a ground-breaking ceremony with the City of Inverness should be scheduled. Mr. Hunter shared the following and subsequently, Mr. Esposito emailed this information to the MPO Board on October 10, 2023:

257165-3 US 41 from SR 44 to S of Withlacoochee Trail Bridge

- Design (PE) completed.
- Right-of-Way (ROW) phase has been completed.
- Construction (CST) started October 3, 2023, (anticipated to last 2 years).

257165-4 US 41 from S of Withlacoochee Trail Bridge to N of N Sportsman Pt

- Design (PE) underway with final plans expected in fall 2024.
- Right-of-Way (ROW) phase scheduled to begin this year upon MPO Board approval of the Roll-Forward Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Amendment October 5, 2023.
- Construction (CST) scheduled for fall 2025.

257165-5 US 41 from N of N Sportsman Pt to N of E Arlington St:

- Design (PE) underway with final plans expected in summer 2026.
- Right-of-Way (ROW) phase scheduled to begin May 2024.

Overview:

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) State Safety Office awards subgrants to traffic safety partners that undertake priority area programs and activities to improve traffic safety and reduce crashes, serious injuries, and fatalities. Subgrants may be awarded for assisting in addressing traffic safety deficiencies, expansion of an ongoing activity, or development of a new program.

Subgrants are awarded to state and local safety-related agencies as "seed" money to assist in the development and implementation of programs in traffic safety priority areas. Funding for these subgrants are apportioned to states annually from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) according to a formula based on population and road miles. Occasionally, additional funding may be available for projects in other program areas if there is documented evidence of an identified problem.



Eligibility

Many types of organizations are eligible to receive traffic safety subgrant funding: government agencies, political subdivisions of state, local, city and county government agencies, law enforcement agencies, state colleges and state universities, school districts, fire departments, public emergency service providers, and certain qualified non-profit organizations (e.g., MADD, SADD, etc.).

Funding Cycle

Subgrants are awarded on a federal fiscal year basis (October 1–September 30). Below is a timeline of the subgrant process.



- January 1–Last day of February—Entities interested in applying for funding submit concept papers describing their proposed efforts for the next award cycle beginning October 1.
- August–September—Entities are notified as to whether or not their concept paper has been selected and additional information on how to complete the Subgrant for Highway Safety Funds.
- October 1—Subgrant fiscal year begins
- September 30—Subgrant fiscal year ends

The State Safety Office reviews all concept papers for compliance with state and federal regulations. Concept papers that comply with these regulations are prioritized using the following criteria:

- Does the concept paper request, satisfy a specific traffic safety need, identified by the FDOT State Safety Office?
- Does the agency making the funding request, serve a city/county ranked in the top 35% of its
 population group for the priority area in which funds are being requested according to the Florida
 Highway Safety Matrices?
- Does the crash data supplied in the concept paper's "Statement of the Problem" document an existing traffic safety problem? (Citation data and survey results can also be used to document the problem.)
- How does this request for funding tie into the Strategic Highway Safety Plan (goals and objectivities)?
- If the agency was funded in the past, did it submit reports, invoices, and financial paperwork on a timely basis and implement the activities that were detailed in the subgrant agreement?
- Does the indirect cost rate requested significantly affect the proposed project's ability to adequately address the traffic safety need?



Purpose: The county and city matrices were designed to provide traffic safety planners an objective data-driven tool to rank traffic safety projects. Both counties and cities are divided into three population groups. The numbers in each matrix represent where each county or city ranks within their population group in a particular program area, with "1" representing the highest fatality and serious injury volume. The top **35%** are highlighted in each population group by program area.







BACKGROUND

In September 1992, the City of Brooksville and Hernando County executed an interlocal agreement establishing the Spring Hill/Hernando County Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) to carry out a continuing, coordinated, and comprehensive transportation planning process. The creation of the MPO was the result of the population in the urbanized area reaching over 50,000 individuals. Subsequently, in June 1999, the MPO name was changed to the Hernando County Metropolitan Planning Organization (HCMPO).

In 2014, the Hernando County Metropolitan Area was re-apportioned by the Governor. Citrus County (which is contiguous and borders Hernando County) merged with the Hernando County MPO, and; therefore, became the Hernando/Citrus Metropolitan Planning Organization which includes Hernando County and the City of Brooksville, and Citrus County and the City of Inverness and the City of Crystal River.



2023 METROPOLITAN PLANNING AREA BOUNDARY MAP




